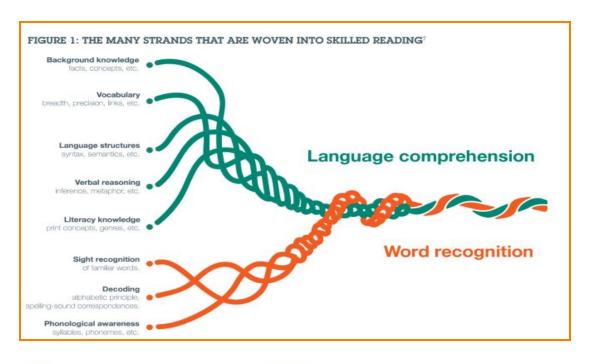

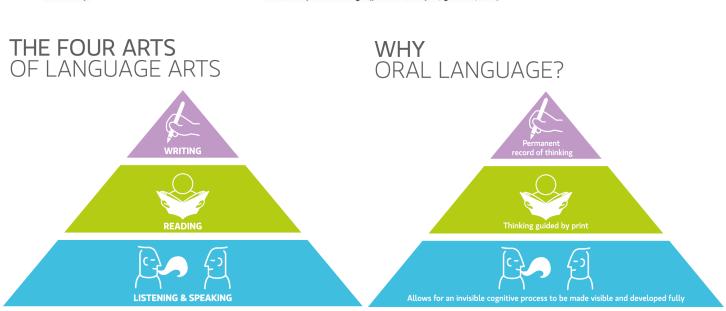

Strategies

Zoom Out - Choose an image from the story you think will create inquiry. Break that image into 3-5 parts, zooming out on the image each time.

Ask the following questions for the first image...

- What do you see? (Concrete assumptions)
- What do you think it could be? (created based on what they see)
- What do you wonder? (Statements or questions based on what they see and think)

Ask the following questions for the remainder of images...

- What new things do you see?
- How has this changed your thinking?
- What new things do you wonder?
