A thinking routine

- What do you see? What details stand out? (At this stage, elicit observations, not interpretations.)
- What do you think is going on? What makes you say that?
- What does this make you wonder? What broader questions does this image raise for you?

Criteria for Developing Essential Questions

open-ended with many possible answers	more effective	less effective	closed with a clear answer or answers
inspires exploration and inquiry			does not inspire research and the independent pursuit of additional knowledge
invites additional questions			does not allow for generative questioning
applies to learners of any age			question is too complicated or simplistic
contains big ideas that inspire classroom interdisciplinary experiences			specific to one particular idea or topic

Norms for Collaborative Conversations

- Take turns speaking
- Listen to the speaker
- Do not interrupt the speaker
- Speak about the topic

^{*}Some students will need support with how to listen or respond to others. Give them sentence starters, for example: "I heard you say...."
