

Framing Question:



How do we create authentic opportunities for students to show what they know and apply their learning?







Common Ground

Description: Common ground is a way for group members to share background information strengths, abilities, and interests. Begin by creating an imaginary line across the length of the room, with half being the "yes" side and the other the "no" side. For younger students, it might be helpful to use tape to create an actual line and mark the sides. Gather everyone on the "no" side of the line. Call out questions such as "Do you play a musical instrument?" (See a list of possibilities below.) Students who play a musical instrument step to the "yes" side; the remainder stay on the "no" side. During the activity, you may request more details-for example, asking each




